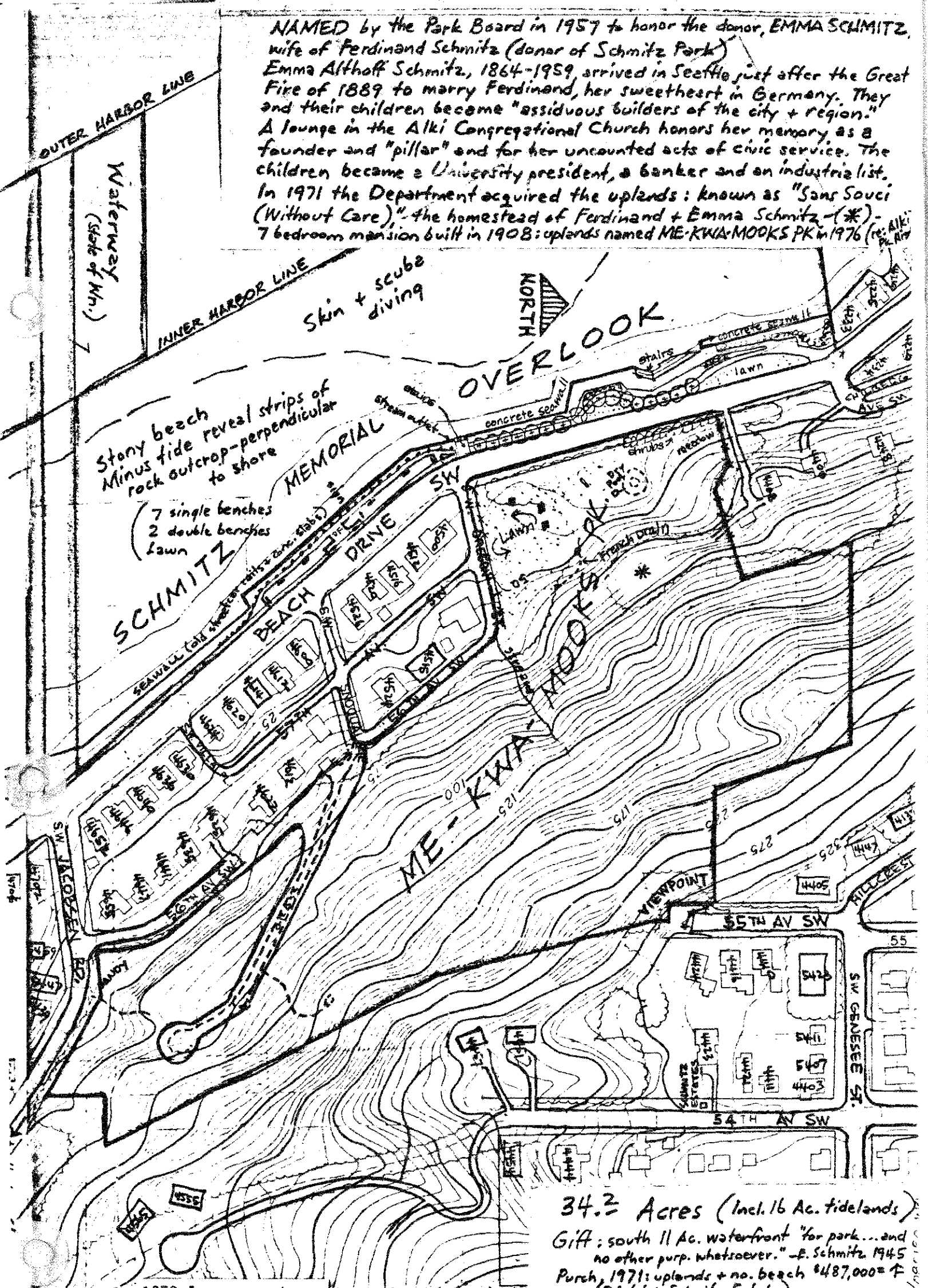


NAMED by the Park Board in 1957 to honor the donor, EMMA SCHMITZ, wife of Ferdinand Schmitz (donor of Schmitz Park)
 Emma Althoff Schmitz, 1864-1959, arrived in Seattle just after the Great Fire of 1889 to marry Ferdinand, her sweetheart in Germany. They and their children become "assiduous builders of the city + region."
 A lounge in the Alki Congregational Church honors her memory as a founder and "pillar" and for her uncounted acts of civic service. The children became a University president, a banker and an industrialist.
 In 1971 the Department acquired the uplands: known as "Sans Souci (Without Care)" - the homestead of Ferdinand + Emma Schmitz - (*) - 7 bedroom mansion built in 1908; uplands named ME-KWA-MOOKS PK in 1976 (re: ALKI PK. 1976)

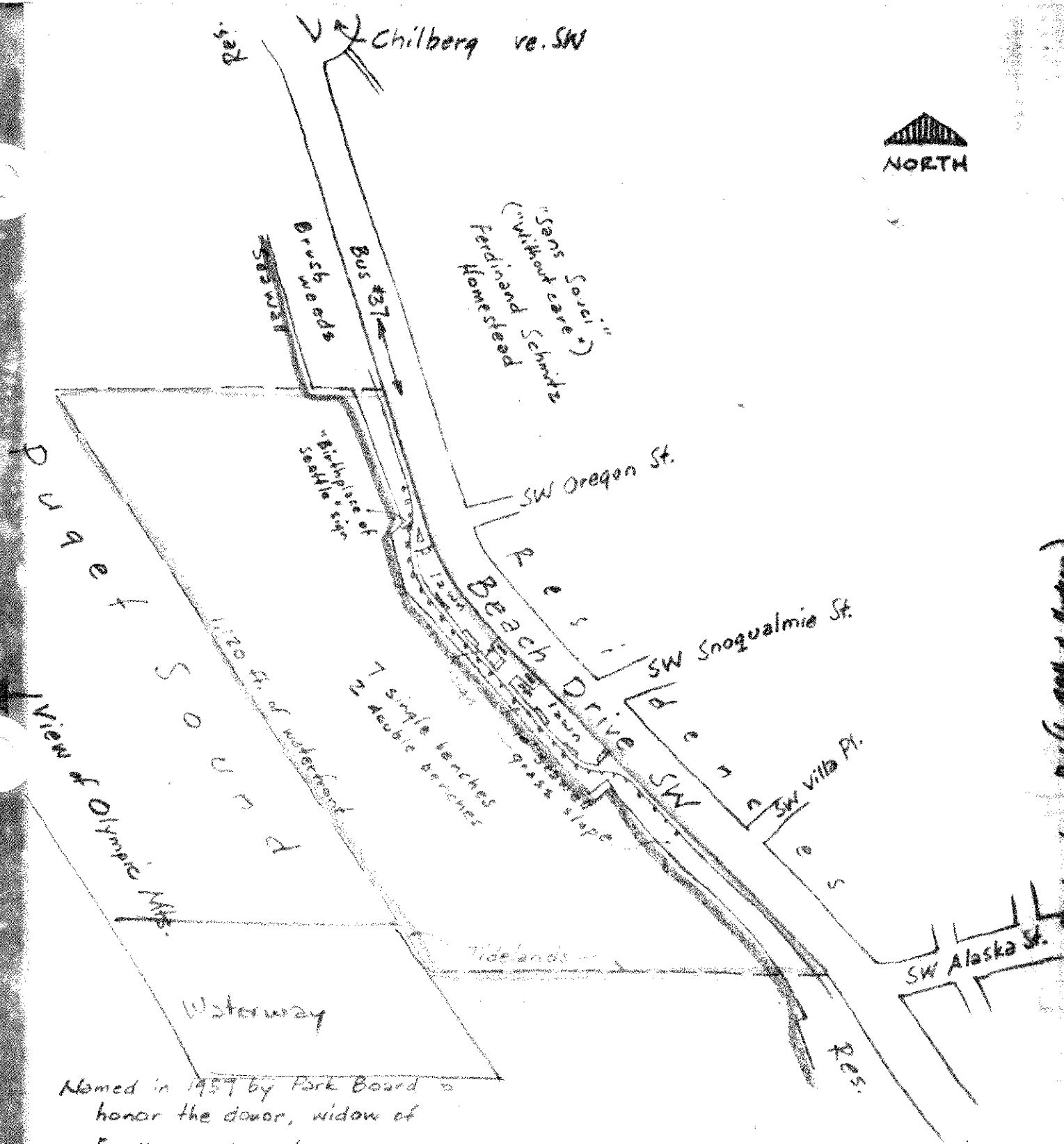
